

The Ville de Montréal, through its Design Montréal office, will present the second Phyllis Lambert Design Montréal Grant to a Montréal designer or design collective with fewer than 10 years' practice, and having demonstrated exceptional quality in studies and work as well as marked interest in the city, particularly Montréal.

The grant is named in honour of Phyllis Lambert, a great Montrealer, passionate champion of excellence in architecture and staunch defender of emerging designers. In naming the grant for Ms. Lambert, the Ville de Montréal seeks to underscore her remarkable contribution to the international reputation of Montréal and to the quality of life of its citizens, as well as the decisive influence she has had on the quality of urban planning, architecture and design in the city.

The grant must be used for a professional development project that:

- involves a design theme focusing on the city; and
- takes place in one of the cities of the UNESCO Creative Cities Network: Aswan, Egypt; Berlin, Germany; Bologna, Italy; Buenos Aires, Argentina; Edinburgh and Glasgow, Scotland; Iowa City and Santa Fe, United States; Kobe and Nagoya, Japan; Lyon, France; Melbourne, Australia; Popayan, Colombia; Seville, Spain; and Shenzhen, China.

The professional development project may be in the form of:

- a study trip;
- a work internship;
- participation in a design competition, workshop, symposium or any other activity relevant to the advancement of a nascent design career.

The project must be completed before May 1, 2010.

\$10,000 award

A **\$10,000** award is given to the grant recipient. A further amount of \$5,000 is added to the budget of the Design Montréal office to fund activities promoting the grant recipient and dissemination of the project.

Objectives of the grant

The goals of the Phyllis Lambert Design Montréal Grant are to:

- pay tribute to Phyllis Lambert, a great Montrealer, passionate champion of excellence in architecture and staunch defender of emerging designers;
- recognize and promote the talents of emerging Montréal designers;
- help enrich the career path of emerging designers and their professional development as they relate to design issues surrounding the city;
- foster international networking and development of markets for emerging Montréal designers;
- contribute to leadership and exchanges within the UNESCO Creative Cities Network;
- promote the integration of emerging designers in professional settings; and
- stimulate initial professional recognition for emerging designers.

Eligibility* If the applicant is a design collective, all members must be eligible, and a co-ordinator must be designated to represent them.

- Must be a professional with a university degree in a design discipline (e.g.: architecture, landscape architecture, interior design, graphic design, industrial design, urban planning) and having fewer than 10 years' professional practice.
- Must be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident, and have been a citizen of Montréal for at least 12 months.
- The proposed development project, i.e., a study trip, work internship or participation in a design competition, workshop, symposium, etc., must take place in one of the cities of the UNESCO Creative Cities Network.
- The development project must involve a design theme focusing on the city.

Conditions for participation

Application deadline

Presentation requirements

Each application must be submitted in a single copy, on letter-size (8 1/2" x 11") paper, printed in a font size of at least 11 points. To make photocopying easier, documents must be neither stapled nor bound.

Each application must include the following:

- A letter of intent (maximum 1,000 words) describing the project (nature of project, context, contact(s) already established, location, timetable) and demonstrating:
 - marked interest in issues related to the city and to urban living conditions (with examples of previously completed work as support);
 - the relevance of the work internship or proposed project to the applicant's skills development and career advancement (expected benefits for the applicant);
 - the relevance of the city or cities chosen among those in the UNESCO Creative Cities Network;
- The duly completed application form;
- A chronological résumé - maximum 3 pages (if the applicant is a design collective, provide the résumé of the co-ordinator only);
- The preliminary timetable for completion (maximum 1 page);
- 1 or more of the following documents: videocassette (VHS), DVD, 20 (max.) digital images (on photo CD-ROM) of projects completed within the past 10 years (max. 3 MB per photo).

Optional

- If available, a press kit (max. five pages) consisting of photocopies of print media articles published within the past five years (excess pages will be discarded prior to review).
- To be provided only if the applicant is selected as a finalist:
 - Proof of registration for or invitation to a workshop, exhibition or any other event; and/or
 - A letter of acceptance from a professor or director in the case of a study trip, or from a manager in the case of an internship in a firm or agency.

Selection process

1. The **call for applications** is issued on January 23, 2009, within the Montréal architecture, landscape architecture, design and urban planning community (e.g., universities, professional associations, media) and ends on **April 14, 2009**.
2. Design Montréal verifies the eligibility of each application.
3. The jury members study each application individually before convening.
4. The jury convenes to assess the applications and choose up to 3 finalists to be called in for interviews prior to final selection of the grant recipient.
5. Design Montréal informs all applicants, in writing, of its answer.
6. In mid-June, the recipient of the Phyllis Lambert Design Montréal Grant is publicly announced and the grant officially handed out.

Jury and assessment criteria

An independent **jury** made up of representatives recognized by the design community will study the eligible applications using the following **assessment criteria**:

- quality and relevance of the applicant's profile (e.g., calibre of achievements, involvement in the community);
- interest and relevance of the grant's contribution to the proposed project;
- contacts already established;
- feasibility of the proposal;
- clarity of applicant's work intentions;
- presentation quality of the application documentation.

All applications will be assessed on the basis of merit as well as compliance with the eligibility conditions, the competition objectives and the assessment criteria. The jury's decision is final and without appeal.

General regulations and conditions

The grant recipient undertakes to complete the project as described, insofar as is possible, and to notify the Ville de Montréal of any major change thereto. He or she further undertakes to make changes to the project based on recommendations from the jury.

The 2009 grant recipient must complete the project no later than May 1, 2010, otherwise the city may withdraw its contribution.

The recipient undertakes to submit a mid-term progress report at a meeting with the Design Montréal office. The recipient must also submit a final project report within 3 months of returning to Montréal, and publicly present the results of the project in keeping with the terms and conditions established by the Design Montréal office. A copy of the recipient's airline ticket may be requested.

The recipient must be available for media interviews.

The Ville de Montréal will not return application documentation to applicants who are not selected. Applicants who wish to recover their documentation, however, may arrange to pick it up provided that they make a request to this effect to the Design Montréal office no later than July 3, 2009.

The Ville de Montréal assumes no liability in the event that documents submitted are lost or damaged in transit. It is therefore recommended that applicants not include original documents with their applications.

The Ville de Montréal guarantees the confidentiality of documents, subject to the applicability of the *Loi sur l'accès aux documents des organismes publics et sur la protection des renseignements personnels* (Act Respecting Access to Documents Held by Public Bodies and the Protection of Personal Information).

A designer who moves after submitting an application must notify Design Montréal of such change of address as soon as possible to ensure that correspondence is sent to the new address.

**The assessment criteria, jury selection procedures and conditions for awarding of the Phyllis Lambert Design Montreal Grant are subject to annual review and may be modified according to the needs and expectations of partners.*

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
